Message from our Chaplain

Dear Friends,

Last month I devoted this column to an article in *America* magazine entitled *Parent Power*. It was written by Joseph A. Califano, the chairman and president of the

National Center on Addiction and Substance Abuse at Columbia University. The core of what I shared last week is that 10.6 million high

schoolers (almost 2/3 of all high schoolers) and 2.4 million middle schoolers (more than ¼ of all middle schoolers) are attending schools where drugs are used, kept or sold. Mr. Califano states that our schools and our government have largely failed to reduce the availability of drugs. The role of parents is, therefore, critical.

The good news, based on research, is that strong, positive family

relationships are a powerful deterrent to teen smoking, drinking and drug use. Here is the significant finding that I hope we all think about: frequent family dinners are a simple yet powerful way to influence teen

behavior. Teens who have family dinners less often than three times a week are much more likely to smoke, drink and use drugs than those

who have five family dinners a Family dinners create an week. environment where teens can talk with their parents problems, where family tension is reduced and where parents can express pride in their teens. Frequent family dinners are a simple but powerful way to influence teen behavior. Only 13% of teens who have frequent family dinners have marijuana, compared with 35% of teens who have dinner with their parents no more than twice a week.

Additionally, teens who attend weekly religious services – or who say that religion is an important part of their lives – are at half the risk of smoking, drinking or using drugs as are those who do not attend such services. Obviously, it is unlikely that 12- to 17-year-olds will go to church without their parents. It goes without saying that this is also true for younger children.

Parents have a great deal of power in curbing substance abuse, more than the laws of government or the rules of schools. I pray we will use this power.

 perspective. Beware of getrich-quick schemes few of them work. Instead, patience is the more productive approach and it requires less of your daily energy. A long-term outlook is even more crucial if your financial goals (higher education for children, retirement) are well in the future.
- 6. Trim down your high interest debt as fast as

possible. Would you have bought that \$1,000 big-screen TV if the price were \$1,180? That's what you'd pay if you added the 18 percent annual interest typically charged by a store credit card. Even if you're loath to tap your savings account, you'll come out ahead by using it to liquidate a high-interest debt that's been hanging around for months...if not years. Be prepared for unexpected

Be prepared for unexpected expenditures. When these occur, it certainly helps to have some money in reserve.
