Beetles to Dragonflies



The famous film director Cecil B. DeMille shared an experience he had many years ago. He was in a canoe by himself, fishing on a lake in Maine. As the day wore on, the canoe drifted near the shore where the water was only about six inches deep. DeMille looked down and saw that the bottom of the lake was filled with water beetles. As he watched, one of the beetles slowly came to the surface and crawled up the side of the canoe. Finally, the beetle reached the top and attached itself to the wood of the canoe and died. DeMille simply returned to his fishing.

A few hours later, he noticed that the beetle's shell had become very dry and brittle in the hot sun. As he watched, the shell slowly split and a dragonfly emerged. The dragonfly started to fly with its magnificent colors flashing in the sunlight. The dragonfly flew farther in an instant than the water beetle had crawled in days.

DeMille imagined that the water beetles might also have seen the dragonfly, but now their former companion was in a world beyond their comprehension. They were still living in their limited world while their winged cousin had found a new existence. Sometime later, Cecil B. DeMille reflected on this experience and concluded with this question: "Would the great Creator of the universe do such a thing for a water beetle and not for a human being?" This means that dying leads to rising, death leads to new life. The water beetle becoming a dragonfly is a very concrete and beautiful way of understanding this.

We can also see this mystery of death leading to new life right in everyday experiences. If we die to our pride and say, "I am sorry," a relationship can grow and come to fuller life. If as children we die to our desire to play all the time and instead do our schoolwork, we can become competent and fully alive adults. Death leads to resurrection.

Jesus tells us that the same thing happens when we die to our bodies. Our physical death in and through Christ leads to a new and fuller life. I'm sure you can think of many examples to illustrate life to death and death to eternal life. In this month of remembrance let us call to mind that death is not the end but only the beginning, the beginning of new life.

Abortion and Health Care Reform

WASHINGTON—In an extraordinary call to Catholics to prevent health care reform from being derailed by the abortion lobby, the United Sates Conference of Catholic Bishops has sent bulletin inserts to almost 19,000 parishes across the country.

"Health care reform should be about saving lives, not destroying them," the insert states. It urges readers to contact Senate leaders so they support efforts to "incorporate longstanding policies against abortion funding and in favor of conscience rights" in health reform legislation.

health care reform bill and in expectation that they will show up in parishes in early November. Cardinal Francis George of Chicago, president of the USCCB; Cardinal Justin Rigali of Philadelphia, chair of the bishops' Committee on Pro-life Activities; Bishop John Wester of Salt Lake City, chair of the Committee on Migration; and Bishop William Murphy of Rockville, Centre, New York, chair of the Committee on Domestic Justice and Human Development urged fellow bishops to promote this campaign in their dioceses.

"The bishops want health care reform, but they recoil at any expansion of abortion," said Helen Osman, USCCB Secretary for Communications, who helped organize the campaign. "Most Americans don't want to pay for other people's abortions via health care either. This impasse on the road to reform of health care can be broken if Congress writes in language that assures that the Hyde Amendment law continues to guide U.S. federal spending policy."

The Catholic bishops have a long history of support for health care reform based on its teaching that health care is essential for human life and dignity and on its experience providing health care and assisting those without coverage.
