"We're Under Attack"

Supreme Chaplain Bishop Lori Appointed Archbishop of Baltimore

Bishop William E. Lori, who led the <u>Roman Catholic Diocese</u> of Bridgeport through a wrenching sexual abuse scandal left behind by his predecessor while emerging as a forceful national voice for religious liberty, has been named the 16th archbishop of Baltimore. Bishop Lori also served as the Supreme Chaplain for the Knights of Columbus.



Pope Benedict XVI made the announcement Tuesday, according to the Vatican Information Service.

Lori succeeds Cardinal Edwin O'Brien, who served as Baltimore's 15th archbishop from October 2007 to August 2011 when he was named pro-grand master of the Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulchre of Jerusalem.

Lori, the 60-year-old leader of the Bridgeport diocese since March 2001, had been viewed as the favorite for the job after taking an increasingly prominent role among U.S. bishops in recent years. He will be formally installed in his new post May 16. Until then, he continues in Bridgeport.

During Lori's time in Bridgeport, he helped write the Dallas Policy, also known as the <u>Charter</u> for the Protection of Children and Young People, which set zero tolerance for abusive priests; fought off a proposed state law to place control of parishes in the hands of laypeople; and testified before Congress on the need for religious liberty.

At Tuesday morning's news conference, he told press, clergy and nuns that the issue of religious freedom is a priority of the U.S. Conference of Bishops, "and I will carry this issue forward. It's been hard to miss that there has been an erosion of religious liberty in this country, along with the secularization of society." He said he will also stress evangelical outreach in an effort to draw more people into the church.

The Metropolitan Archdiocese of Baltimore is the nation's oldest, serving nearly 550,000 Catholics attending approximately 100 churches. About 45 percent of people residing in the archdiocese are Catholic, making Baltimore the 39th largest diocese. Bridgeport is the nation's 45th largest.

"The new evangelization is proclaiming the gospel afresh," said Lori, who appeared at the Tuesday news conference bare-headed, without the traditional red skull cap. "It's a matter of listening. People sometimes have a caricature of what the church teaches, rather than what it does teach."

Lori follows in the footsteps of the late Cardinal Shehan, who was the first bishop of Bridgeport when the diocese was created in 1953 and left to become archbishop of Baltimore in 1961. Shehan was elevated to cardinal in 1965 and died in 1984. Lori, like Shehan, had been an auxiliary bishop in Washington, D.C.

Lori on Tuesday fielded questions on Maryland's pending referendum on gay marriage, and on church closures and new vocations.

"Marriage is one man and one woman; it's an institution that predates governments," he said. "I'll be teaching as a bishop and working with other bishops and leaders in Maryland as the referendum unfolds." Having moved to close several Bridgeport-area churches, citing declining parish enrollments, Lori faces the same issue in his new post. "That is not uncommon in a large diocese as this one is," Lori said.

Undoubtedly the most explosive issue during Lori's time in Bridgeport was the disposition of dozens of sexabuse lawsuits against priests brought against the diocese in previous years. Lori settled those lawsuits, with the diocese paying out about \$36million.

We are indeed fortunate to have Bishop Lori join us as we begin our fight against the recently passed "gay marriage" bill as it would only be a matter of time before the administration in Annapolis pushed to force the Catholic Church to perform gay marriages.

Excerpts of an article written by non-Catholic Sam Miller - a prominent Cleveland Jewish businessman:

Evil Truly Walks Astride the World

Introducing Peter Singer

Peter Singer, a prominent philosopher and ethicist, who is the Ira W. DeCamp Professor of Bioethics at Princeton University has a rather strange value system, at least to us as Catholics. He is a very prominent philosopher who champions animal rights yet also promotes the idea of killing handicapped newborns on the basis of they have not yet achieved "personhood."

It is his bizarre concept of "personhood" that we as Catholics find so abhorrent. Singer argues that human development is a gradual process so that it is nearly impossible to mark a particular moment in time as *the* moment at which human life begins.

Professor Singer says that a newborn child has no ability for rational thought, no autonomy, and no sense of self-consciousness. Because of that it has no ability yet to have preferences (such as wanting to live), therefore "killing a newborn baby is never equivalent to killing a person, that is, a being who wants to go on living."

So, the natural progression of thought says just as pro-choice people claim that a fetus is just a lump of tissue, a newborn child is merely a logical extension of that concept – a bigger lump of tissue. And since a newborn child or a handicapped child, or even a Handicapped adult, is not fully a person in Singer's judgment, so it is fine if we kill him or her. In fact, a person with severe brain damage or who is in a coma is not truly a fully rational human and therefore can be killed or otherwise dispensed with.

Singer also argues that in some situations, euthanasia is morally acceptable particularly in the case of self directed euthanasia. Oddly, or perhaps not so oddly, Professor Singer's mother suffers from Alzheimer's and Singer stated in an interview that if he was responsible for his mother's care, instead of his sister who is currently in charge, he might direct that she not continue to live.

Professor Singer's philosophy derives from his belief that he considers humans to be nothing special, simply one variety of animal and in fact he described humans as, "we are great apes." I suppose this helps explain the low regard he has for baby humans. Oddly enough, Professor Singer is a vegan and doesn't believe in killing animals for food. Apparently, he seems to accord more respect to animals than he does to us great ape humans.

This shows the depths to which our society has sunk. A renowned professor at one of our most prestigious universities, advocates killing people who are substandard in any way whether they are handicapped or aged or just newly born.

I'm not sure I would want to live in Peter Singer's world. Thank God for the Catholic Church and our bishops who are saying "NO" to Planned Parenthoods abortions and history of eugenics and our current President who voted to let babies who are accidentally born during an abortion to be allowed to be put into a cupboard and allowed to die.


